You just need to remember:

Retrospective applications are **not accepted**.

All applications **must** include:

- * Project Description
- * Proposed Project Date (especially for a visit or science week)
- * Detailed break-down of costs

Your school can receive up to a total of **£1,650** worth of grants over the next three years!

The Edina Trust is working in collaboration with the National Museum of Wales. The 'Spring Bulbs for Schools' Project gives pupils the opportunity to be part of a real science investigation where they will contribute to the final result. This is a live experiment where there are no known outcomes and no 'right' answers.

This project is a long running climate change investigation, currently involving 65 primary schools across Wales. In collaboration with the Edina Trust, this project has been extended to 50 selected Edina schools in Oxfordshire, Fife, Midlothian, the Scottish Borders and Lancashire.

The Trust plans to expand the number of schools taking part next school year (2013/14) to 75 schools across all of our regions. We would very much like South Lanarkshire schools to become involved. If you are interested, please email **Grace** for an application form.
